STATIONS OF THE CROSS AND SOUP SUPPER - LENT begins early this year on February 14, Valentine's Day. As Catholics, we honor the seasons of our faith and Lent is a season of reflection, fasting, penance, and almsgiving. What are you and your family planning for Lent this year? As a church family, St. Mary by the Sea parish is planning community prayer each Friday evening beginning February 16 with Stations of the Cross followed by a soup supper in the parish hall. This year, the soup supper will include discussions on the faith entitled "Why do Catholics do that?" and then, "Let's stump the priest!" Stations of the Cross will begin at 5:15 pm and soup will be served beginning about 5:45 pm. Our first topic will be about Lent - how did it start, what does the Catechism say about it, what do the ashes mean, and so on. We encourage all families to attend together so that we all can encourage our children in the practice of the faith. Teenagers, junior high and grade school students - adults, seniors, and super seniors! Everyone is welcome. Let's make this season of Lent the best ever.

REFLECTION FROM FATHER AKUTI

Reading about a day's ministry in the life of Jesus in today's gospel, we come to know about how the work of healing the sick would be draining and overwhelming. Mark writes of how the whole town was at the door, all those ill or possessed by demons. Jesus cured many, but it's so hard emotionally to see so many who are ill in body and spirit.

Jesus as a human must have been exhausted and drained. He then did what we all need to consider. He found solitude and prayed. That didn't last for long as the apostles found him, and Jesus went to continue the work of preaching and praying.

Our own lives often become too full as well and can drain us in mind, body and spirit. Even when it's good work or family or things we like to do, we need to step back and find that quiet place to pray and reflect. We can turn to Jesus to ask him to refill those reserves that are running on empty. In prayer and solitude, Jesus might have asked for help to continue to do the work, for patience when it seemed too many people surrounded him, for understanding when the demands seem to be too much.

I sometimes have the similar prayer - when I am overwhelmed by work, parish demands and my own procrastination. I am lucky to love what I do and to love my local community, but sometimes, it's overwhelming.

Taking that time to pray and reflect offers a spiritual and emotional boost. And, then, as Jesus did, I get back to work and juggling responsibilities.

In today's first reading, we hear from Job, who calls life a futility and ends his day without hope. We all feel that way sometimes. But it would be good to remember the words of the psalm where the Lord heals the brokenhearted. I pray for respite and energy to live my life with hope and love.

TAKEAWAYS:

We need to be instruments for Jesus' healing work. Bringing *healing and wholeness* is Jesus' ministry even today. We all need healing for our minds, our memories, and our broken relationships.

And now Jesus is also using counselors, doctors, friends, and even strangers in his healing ministry. Let us ask for the ordinary healing we need in our own lives. When we are healed, let us not forget to thank Jesus for his goodness, mercy, and compassion by turning to serve others.

Our own healing process is completed only when we are ready to help others in their needs and to focus on things outside ourselves.

Let us also be instruments for Jesus' healing by visiting the sick and praying for their healing. And let us remember that we need the Lord's strength not only to make ourselves and others well, but to make us and others complete.

2) We need to live for others as Jesus did: Jesus was a man for others, sharing what he had with others. In his life there was time for prayer, time for healing, and time for reconciliation.

Let us take up this challenge by sharing love, mercy, compassion and forgiveness with others. Instead of considering life as dull and pointless, let us live our lives as Jesus did, full of dynamism and zeal for the glory of God.
